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### *Tree Care*

Old trees have low tolerance to **disturbance** in the root area so **avoid** installing hard surfaces particularly near the trunk. Alternately you can create soft pathways using permeable paving options such as woodchips.

Constant damp encourages fungus so **minimise watering** within 1 metre of large trunks. Make it easy for yourself by choosing companion plants with similar watering requirements.

### *Conservation Significance*

**Blackbutt** (*Eucalyptus pilularis*) and **Rough-barked Apple** (*Angophora floribunda*) Forest of Dangar Island is of **State and Regional Conservation Significance**. This remnant vegetation community is found intact here on Dangar Island on the ridge top, extending down the slopes, continuous along the Riverview Avenue road reserve plus fragments within neighbouring properties.

**She-oak** (*Allocasuarina torulosa*) is also an important mid-canopy tree, providing food and habitat for visiting **Glossy Black-Cockatoos** (*Calyptorhynchus lathami*), registered on the **IUCN Red List** of Threatened Species due to their declining populations.

**Swamp Mahogany** (*Eucalyptus robusta*) on the alluvial flats of the island are remnant trees of Coastal River-flat Forest listed as an **Endangered Ecological Community in NSW**, also rare and depleted in Hornsby Shire.
